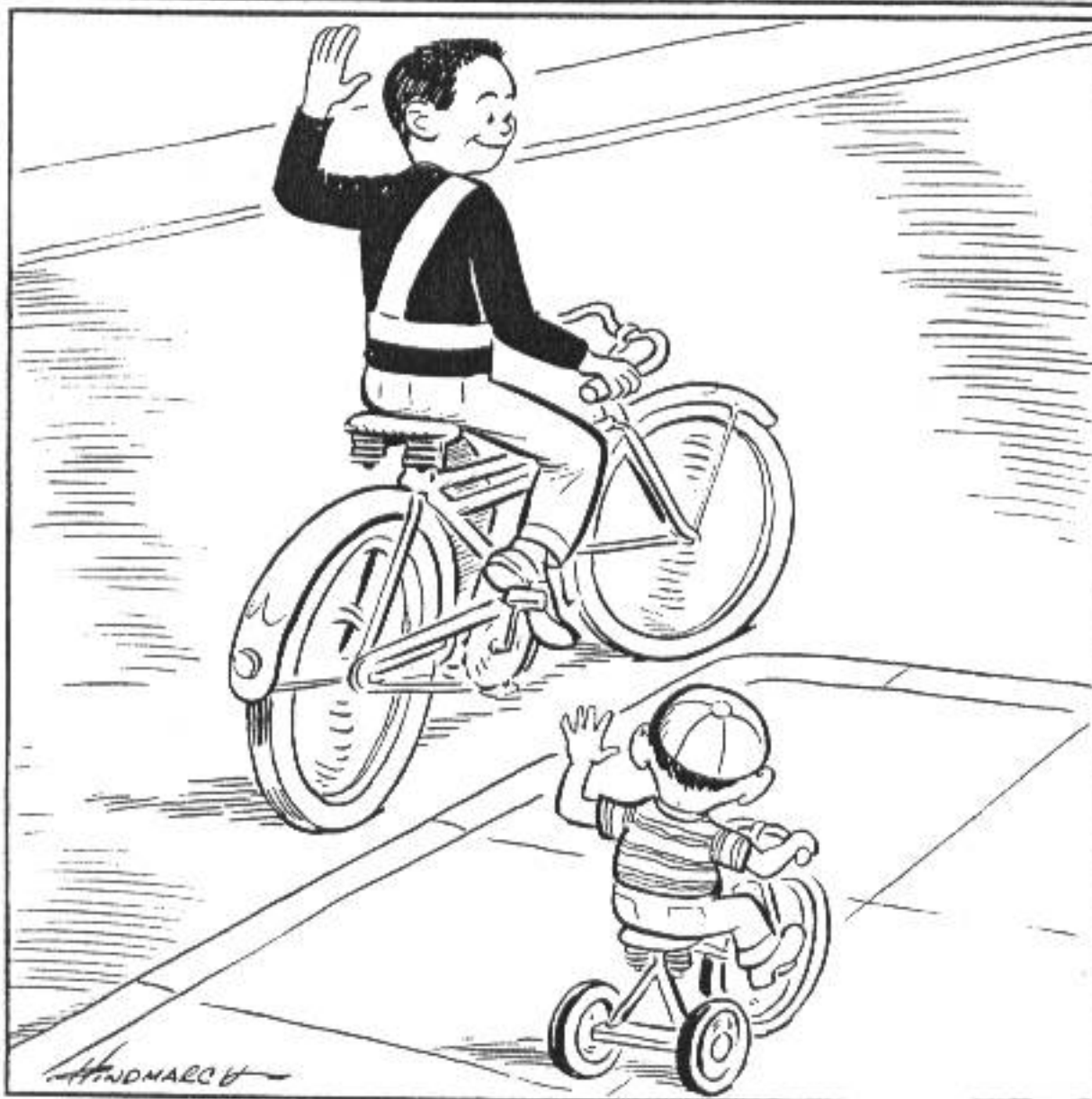

They should tell their playmates it is dangerous to hitch rides on moving vehicles.

They should tell playmates to ride tricycles and to roller skate on the sidewalk.

Rules For Safe Pedaling

Cyclists Must Obey Rules Of Road

When school days end and the summer vacation begins, the bicycles will get more use. But there will also be more passenger cars and trucks on the streets and highways.

With more cyclists and more automobile and truck traffic, there will likely be more accidents in the heavy traffic, which makes it essential for bicycle riders to obey all traffic rules and regulations.

Since bicycles do not afford the same protection as an automobile, even a

minor accident can prove serious, with a disabling injury possible.

Cyclists are expected to obey traffic signals, always giving proper turn signals. Riding your playmates on the "handlebars" or package carrier on the rear fender is another dangerous practice. Bikes were designed for one person.

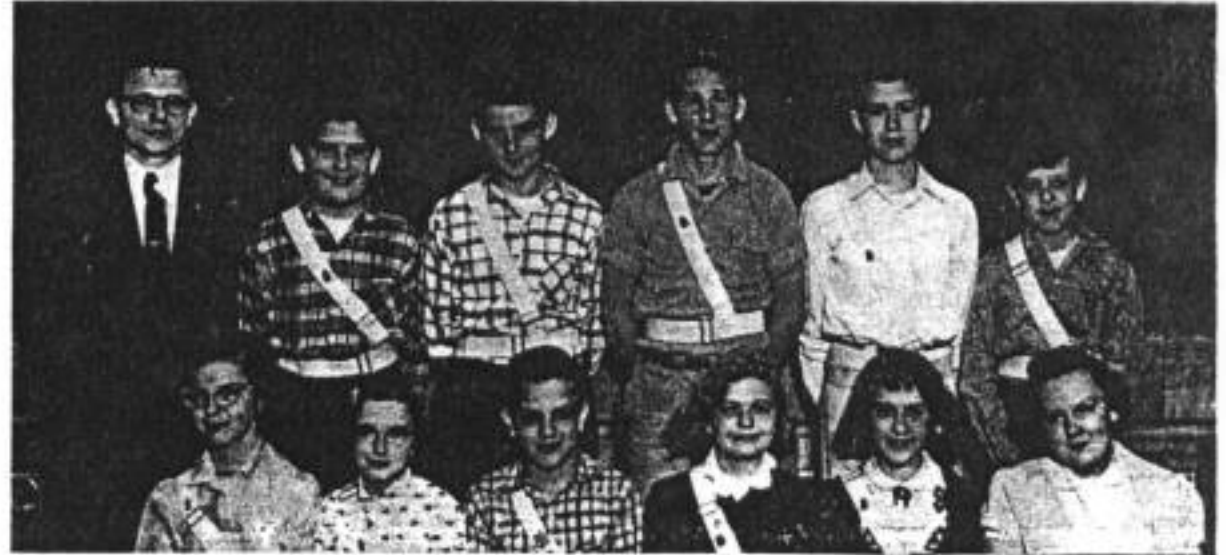
In the interest of safety, it is a good idea to equip bicycles with a headlight, red rear reflector and a horn. Night
